President's Report

First and foremost, I would like to pay tribute to our former Conference President, Elder Mike Hewitt, who served diligently during the first half of this term. Additionally, I extend my heartfelt appreciation to our dedicated staff, teachers, and pastors, all of whom have tirelessly contributed to the service of God and our Mountain View Conference Members.

During the period of transition in this term, we remained steadfast to our mission statement, as voted by the Executive Committee in May of 2018.

"We exist to grow healthy churches that reflect Christ's love and compassion in our communities."

Using this mission statement, we have undertaken careful evaluation and implemented nominal adjustments, placing a renewed emphasis on the proclamation of the soon return of Jesus Christ, with the utmost intentionality.

Our administration and pastoral staff have collaborated closely to introduce and execute the, "Tell Somebody About Jesus," initiative, which has yielded promising results in spreading the good news of salvation.

Moreover, we have recognized the significance of allocating resources wisely, specifically regarding dark-country church plants. As a result, we have redirected funds towards revitalizing and supporting existing churches within our conference which is proving to be an effective strategy within our territorial domain.

In the preceding five-year period, the North American Division has observed an average annual membership growth rate of 0.35%. In 2023 the Mountain View Conference has demonstrated an outstanding membership annual growth rate of 5.03%, which is exceptional, and a huge advancement within our territory. Also, the remarkable surge in attendance indicates a nearly twofold increase in participation across the conference. Moreover, this substantial expansion has translated into a sizable increase in both tithe and offering contributions within the conference which translates into more ministry opportunities. 

Secretary/Treasurer's Report


We are thankful to God for His faithful people who engage in ministry, return tithes, and give offerings allowing ministry to move forward in our territory. A big thankyou to each member for your stewardship of finances, time, and talents to see God's church grow and expand.

The Mountain View Conference of Seventh-day Adventists during the five years of 2019 – 2023 has seen a tithe increase, a stronger financial position, and strong membership growth, especially in the last two years. When tithe only turned in from our churches is analyzed, excluding tithe sent directly to the conference office often from individuals in other states, then the average annual gain in tithe for the past five years was 4.98%. This, while the 5-year Consumer Price Index shows an average annual inflation rate of 3.96%, indicates that financially our church members' giving patterns are growing slightly.




We have been blessed each year with unsolicited tithe returned directly to our conference from individuals who often live outside our territory. These windfall donations to "Conference Church" have greatly assisted in our current financial position, yet it is difficult to budget personnel on windfalls.

Giving to Mountain View Mission is a tremendous help to ministries within the conference and we thank you for your support of this offering. We have noticed a declining trend in donations to Mountain View Mission and would like to encourage members to systematically donate to this fund, which is used for many areas including summer camp, Valley Vista, education, evangelism, youth-related ministries, and a variety of other conference needs.




Our overall financial position has increased from 2019 to 2023. The North American Division recently changed working capital requirements to be expressed as the number of months an organization can pay their expenses from available working capital with six months as the minimum.




As you can see by the chart looking at the number of months of available working capital, gradually the conference has been able to bring the finances into a stronger position. This helps tremendously when making personnel decisions tailored toward growth as short-term financial decreases do not need to be met immediately with personnel reductions.

The Executive Committee and administration are focused on bringing revitalization and growth across our conference in a variety of ways and adequate funding is crucial. Our goal is not to hoard funds but to use them wisely for our mission. Having enough margin to operate is critical to planning, however, and I am very thankful for the dedication of God's people in returning a faithful tithe and giving offerings liberally. Of tithe dollars received, the conference as of 2023 controls by policy 62.60% of tithe with the remaining percentages sent to other parts of the world church.






Another measure of success is tied to the number of people attending our churches. Both membership and attendance trends recently have been upward.





We currently have 32 churches, 4 companies, 2 church plants, 15 full-time pastors, and a membership of 2,445.

It has been my privilege to serve as Conference Treasurer since 2003 and to work with many fine individuals. Most recently, I have greatly appreciated working with President Tim Bailey and the office staff of Jane Browning, Amber West, and Liz Bailey who all help in so many ways.

As we move forward, we need to focus as a church and individually on reaching people around us and creating disciples of Jesus. We need to be good stewards of our finances, time, and talents, so let us use our resources wisely in ways that will enrich the kingdom of God in preparation for His soon return.

Adventist Community Services / Campaign for Community

During the past five years, the Mountain View Conference territory has suffered through some periods of flooding, but God blessed us in that it was not as bad as it could have been. Several times flooding was predicted but did not happen.

Adventist Community Services came to the aid in 2015 when many counties of West Virginia were hit with large rainstorms and major flooding. Many homes were damaged and needed cleaning or repairs. Families were left with nowhere to live, many having no way to pay for the repairs and supplies needed to clean their homes and resume their lives.

Adventist Community Services is part of a partnership organization called National VOAD. VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters) is a group of faith-based and non-profit organizations that pool their resources and help in times of disaster. Here in Mountain View, we are a part of a statewide group called West Virginia VOAD.

For several years, I had the opportunity to serve WVVOAD as Chairman of the Board of Directors. I am honored to serve this organization as they supply help when needed the most. The WVVOAD organization has been written into the West Virginia State Emergency Management Plan and may remain the only state VOAD in the union that has been given that honor and distinction. It is a testament to the good work that has been done and is still being done by WVVOAD for the people of our great state. Nationwide, the specialty of ACS is warehousing donated supplies for the needs of families who have been hit by a disaster. When truckloads of supplies come in from private citizens or major corporations, those supplies need to be counted, organized, and stored so that they can be distributed appropriately. This is a busy time for ACS with all being done by hand.

Here in Mountain View, we do not have a trained team to do this warehouse organization. However, at the union level, there are volunteer teams on standby that can be called to active duty for donations warehousing. The ACS Director calls the Columbia Union, and a team of specialists is dispatched to supply the organizational skills needed to operate a warehouse.

It would be very beneficial for the Mountain View Conference to have a locally trained team available for future emergencies. We have a local trainer who has offered to spearhead the training of a team. Mark Hann has all the certifications needed to do whatever training he sees as necessary. The 2015 flooding event lasted for a total of six weeks, which is a long time for the union team to be away from their families. Thus, two trained teams would be an even greater benefit.

The recently acquired feeding trailer is a great asset for our conference should a need arise.

Adventist Community Services is well respected here in Mountain View. I am proud to serve on the Board of Directors of the WVVOAD and, as the ACS director of the Mountain View Conference, I would like to thank each person who donated to Campaign for Community. You are making a difference to those in need.

Communication

Our chief vehicles of communications in the Mtn. View Conference

- Mountain Viewpoint our newsletter appears 6 times yearly in the Visitor, which is circulated to 65,000 homes in the Columbia Union and has 75,000 online readers. This newsletter not only keeps Mountain View members up to date on our current activities and personal interest stories, but also informs members within our conference and union of programs and coming events that may be of interest to them.
- Mountain View SONrise the conference newsletter mailed 3-4 times a year to every MVC constituent, plus others who may live out-of-conference. The newsletter contains articles applying to the eight initiatives of our conference. Those initiatives are: Tell Somebody About Jesus, Regeneration and Revival, Church Planting, Youth, Education, Stewardship, Prayer, and Social Media. One purpose of SONrise is to make it a reclaiming tool for inactive members, as well as a source of inspiration and information to the active members.

Education

We are so blessed! We get to go to work every day to spend time with your precious children and grandchildren. They are amazing, funny, and full of energy. . . and such an encouragement. They are a gift of God to us and will make a huge difference in the world. These children deserve our love and support and the finest education we can provide. Our ministry is totally directed to serving these youngest members of our conference family.

Number and location of schools

- Friends-R-Fun (Summersville), Daycare
- Greenbrier Valley Academy (Lewisburg), Grades K-8
- Highland Adventist School (Elkins), Grades PK-12
- Parkersburg Academy, Grades PK-8
- Summersville Adventist School, Grades K-8

This is a decrease of one K-8 school since we last reported to you in 2018, which is offset by the addition of one early learning center.

During this quinquennium, it was a pleasure to welcome Friends-R-Fun to our Education department. This outstanding childcare center has been successfully serving children in the Summersville area for many years. Friends R Fun is now a part of our Mountain View education team.

Staff

- We currently employ 9 full-time educators through our Office of Education.
- Our local schools also employ other part-time and full-time educators and support staff.

Enrollment as of December 2023 is as follows:

- Total 2023-2024 Opening Enrollment, excluding Friends R Fun, was 99 students.
- This number includes 15 Pre-K students and 84 students in grades K-8.
- Our enrollment reflects a total decrease in enrollment from 2018 to 2023 of 15 students. However. . .
- The enrollment shows an average of 25 students per school, which is an increase over 2018 when the average was 23 students per school.

Covid-19 Survival

- Our schools remained open during COVID-19, with a few short-term closures during the early period of uncertainty. Typically, we operated on a slightly altered schedule, giving extra time for cleaning, etc., but staying open.
- The enrollment of our schools increased during COVID-19, as the public schools closed regular classes and parents were looking for in-person instruction for their children.
- Our schools utilized emergency COVID funds to acquire equipment to help deal with COVID-19 safety protocols.
- As COVID fear retreated and public schools reopened for face-to-face instruction, the enrollment numbers dropped. We found some public-school refugee students returning to free public-school education once it reopened. This year, 2023-2024, we are rebuilding our numbers and are working to keep this trend going.
- A positive result of the changes was the approval of a schedule change.

Schedule change

- Having researched various successful alternative school calendar schedules, our Office of Education queried the West Virginia Department of Education (WVDE) some years ago seeking permission to try some innovative scheduling for our schools. At that time, we were not successful.
- After the prolonged period of COVID-19 public school closures and our program of staying open on a reduced

schedule during that time, we again queried the WVDE for permission to go to a 4-day-a-week schedule. This move was approved by our Mountain View Conference Board of Education (MVCBOE) and the CUOE (Columbia Union Office of Education) on the condition that the WVDE approved it. After legal review by the state, they approved our request. They are evaluating our schools' compliance with state attendance law based on hours per year met rather than the traditional 180-day metric.

 All four of our MVC schools now operate on a schedule of meeting 4 days a week for a longer time period each day. The advantages of the current schedule are:

o Parents have expressed a preference for this four-full-day-a-week schedule rather than having to leave in the middle of their workday each Friday to pick up students at the old noon dismissal time.

o All teacher in-services and meetings are planned for Fridays so that parents can count on the four full days of instruction each week, rather than having to adjust for various Monday meetings that disrupt the school week.

o Teachers use Fridays for planning, grading, and tutoring.

Programs and Activities

Spring Study Tour

o Every other year our Office of Education plans an end-of-school, weeklong study tour. Students from all four schools are invited to participate in this exciting learning experience. o Our most recent trip was in 2023, when we traveled to central Ohio and visited COSI, the Columbus Zoo, Amish Country, and many other interesting learning venues.

• Mission Trip

o On the off year from Spring Study Tours, we promote a mission trip in which our students can participate.

o In the past our mission trips have been planned by Quiet Hour Ministries or sometimes locally planned. More recently, we have appreciated Pastor Walter Cardenas planning and leading our mission trip experiences. The trips no longer are predominantly school system participants but are made up of a blend of young adults, families, and students from our conference.

Educator Professional Development

- Our educators attended the NAD Teachers' Convention in Phoenix in August of 2023.
- Our Department of Education has provided many in-conference teacher training events over the past five years.
 A few of our more recent trainings are:
 - Active Shooter Response Training with deputies from the Randolph County Sheriff's Department
 - Standards-based Instruction with Chris Juhl
 - Mental Health First Aid with CUOE personnel
 - Discipleship in Schools with Pastor MacLafferty
 - Forest Schools and Classrooms

- Our teachers are making regular progress in earning and maintaining professional teaching credentials.
 - 2 of our educators have master's degrees and professional certifications.
 - 5 of our educators have bachelor's degrees and standard certifications.
 - The remaining educators are working toward the next level of certification or degree status.

Maintaining professional credentials is a big focus of our department and the above numbers reflect a huge improvement in that picture. There was a time when we had few credentialed educators on our team. It is said that teachers are born, not made. There is wisdom in this statement. We have long been blessed with dedicated Christians who have the gift of teaching and who have dedicated their talents to our schools, often for little remuneration. We are now working hard to make sure those obvious gifts of teaching are backed up with credentials that demonstrate our excellence to others looking in. We also continue to work to compensate our professional educators with living wages.

- All of our schools are fully accredited with AAA (Adventist Accrediting Association).
- All of our schools are recognized as accredited schools with the WVDE and are on the short list of accredited schools on WVDE's website.

Goals and Plans

- We would like to open more schools. School placement decisions are made at the local level and are based on a local church's self-assessment of potential students and their ability to afford a school. As the MVC Office of Education, we provide support, encouragement, and mentoring whenever we learn of an interest in Adventist education. There are challenges in this area, however. The reality of the costs and work related to starting and operating a school makes it difficult for our small local churches to find a way to make that happen. Resources are limited and spread thin. We continue to look for ways to make that process easier, which is what we believe would help increase the number of schools opening in our conference.
- We will continue to provide ongoing training and support for our educators to move to fully Standards-based Learning (SBL) classrooms. This is an initiative coming from our NAD Office of Education and is being implemented across NAD over the next several years. It is not a change that can be accomplished all at once. The Standardsbased movement involves redirecting our thinking, teaching, and assessment away from basing a student's progress primarily on "seat time" and "paper production" (they attended regularly and got all the papers turned in), but rather on mastering established standards of achievement for each subject studied and being able to demonstrate that mastery through authentic assessment. We are learning and growing in this area, but still have much to learn. The learning will continue, and we will continue implementing SBL as rapidly as we can.

- We are working on plans for a conference-wide outdoor skills event during the second half of the 2023-2024 school year. We would like to make this a regular part of our annual schedule. This year we are working on plans for a bike/camping trip along the North Bend rail trail.
- Our educators are working with local school boards to find ways to grow enrollment and continue to enhance quality at each of our schools.

Summary

It is our privilege to serve the Christian education needs of students in our MVC churches and communities. We are huge believers in the benefits of Adventist education and are honored to be part of the system that is the second-largest Christian school system in the world. Together with over 111,000 Adventist educators, we serve over 2,000,000 students around the world. We will continue our mission of sharing Jesus with the children in our classrooms until He comes. . . or we just can't keep up with them anymore! We thank you for your support of Mountain View Adventist education. Please support our MVC Adventist schools with your prayers, your time, your supportive words, and your financial contributions. 'Amen" (Matthew 28:18-20, NKJV).

We have four active Spanish-speaking congregations. After experiencing some difficulties during the years 2020-2021, we have seen growth and revival in these congregations. During this quinquennial, 13% of the baptisms have been in our Spanish-speaking congregations. We had two church plants: Moorefield Spanish and Vida Nueva (Lewisburg Spanish) which gained company status. Also, a new mission group got started in Parkersburg to reach the growing Spanish-speaking community.

Moorefield Spanish

Moorefield Spanish is our largest Spanishspeaking congregation. They have an attendance of 50 to 65 individuals every week. During COVID-19 they were asked to leave the building that they were renting out and had to start meeting in a tent. Even though the enemy was trying to discourage them, they never gave up and they met in that tent for more than a year (even during the winter months). They kept praying for God to open a door for them to buy some type of property, and in 2021, they purchased a school building which they are remodeling as a church. They began their renovation by making a kitchen, restrooms, and a fellowship area. The congregation meets for church service in the fellowship area of the building and is eagerly working to finish the next phase which includes the sanctuary. During all this adversity they have not stopped witnessing and many have accepted Jesus and joined the church.

Vida Nueva

The Vida Nueva (Lewisburg Spanish) congregation gained company status during this quinquennial. Even though they had difficulties during 2020 and 2021 due to people moving away and the COVID-19 restrictions, the members have been faithful in tending to and reaching out to the community. This has kept their doors open and most recently, there has been an increase in attendance with many decisions for baptism. Over the past few years, they have been actively looking for a building or piece of land to purchase so they can build their church. During this new quinquennial, they are looking forward to continuing to share Jesus with their community and buying and owning a piece of land and erecting a church building.

Morgantown Spanish

After struggling during the years 2020 and 2021, and losing many people because of moving away, in 2023, we have connected with many people in our community. Currently, there are between 15 to 25 people attending the church service every Sabbath afternoon. Many people are studying the Bible and making decisions for the kingdom.

Vida

Vida (Parkersburg) is the newest addition to the Mountain View Conference family of Spanish-speaking congregations. In 2023, they had their first baptisms and are actively seeking to be witnesses to their community. Currently, they have many Bible studies and they have between 20 to 30 people in attendance.

Moving Forward

We look forward to having four of our congregations gain church status as they continue to grow and share Jesus with their communities.

Since assuming the role of Mountain View Conference Pathfinder Director in December 2019, I have meticulously collected and analyzed data regarding the growth and participation of our Pathfinder program from 2018 to 2023.

During the Winter Camp events, we observed the following trends in club participation:

- In 2018, our program consisted of 3 clubs.
- This number increased to 5 clubs in 2019, demonstrating growth and increased interest.
- In 2020, we maintained participation levels with 3 clubs.
- By 2021, the number of clubs decreased to 2, presenting an opportunity for further engagement and recruitment efforts.
- Then, in 2022, we experienced significant progress, cultivating participation from 6 clubs.

- Finally, in 2023, we achieved notable success with the involvement of 8 clubs, further highlighting the positive trajectory of our program.

Additionally, our representation at the Union Camporee held at Summit Bechtel Reserve in 2022 reveals a promising turnout. A total of 46 individuals from the Mountain View Conference actively took part in this event, underscoring the growing influence and engagement of our Pathfinder program.

Furthermore, at the International Camporee in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, our presence was recognized and valued. In 2019, as many as 62 representatives from the Mountain View Conference proudly represented our organization, showcasing our commitment to fostering global connections and promoting our Pathfinder initiatives.

Lastly, we are thrilled to report that our membership numbers have experienced a consistent upward trajectory from 2018 to 2023. This growth showcases the desirability and effectiveness of our Pathfinder program.

As we move forward, we will leverage these insights to further enhance our program and provide an even more rewarding experience for our members. Personal Ministries

Mountain View Conference Churches and Constituents, I am excited and filled with

joy to give you an update. For the past 5 years, the Mountain View Conference has been looking for better ways to connect our churches with their communities.

In 2021 we decided to start ads for Bible studies on Facebook and Instagram. The results blew us away with over 1500 Bible study leads from September 2021 to January 2022. Our pastors were overwhelmed and our team here at the conference decided to move forward with our first annual Lay Bible Workers Training at Valley Vista. The training was filled with 84 attending the weeklong seminar. A fire was lit in our members and our pastors to start working together in giving Bible studies that led to a 20-year record for baptisms.

After the Bible worker training in the spring of 2022, we took our training rallies on the road and trained our members in their local churches. We saw a tremendous jump in total member involvement.

In 2023 we continued with our Bible worker training on the road in the Charleston Blvd. church, where we had over 55 church members and, pastors come together for onsite training. Not only did they learn how to give Bible studies but also door knocking and inviting the community to an evangelism series. They then put this information into use right away by going into multiple communities in the Charleston area and invited people to an evangelism series with much success. The Charleston Blvd. church had over 30 baptisms, and more came later.

Youth and Summer Camp

Youth

These past five years have been different from other years in recent history. The COVID-19 pandemic caused us to do things that required quick creativity and resourcefulness. We turned to Zoom for

solutions and had a weekly Zoom meeting where all the youth were invited to join. Additionally, we had modified in-person events that helped the youth to connect with God and with one another.

Camp Meeting

Camp meeting is a week when many youth and young adults are trained for the great commission and are motivated to stay faithful to God. Since 2020, the format of camp meeting has changed, and the youth and families have been invited to join the different activities of the campus. Also, family worship was implemented in the mornings at the main pavilion in addition to the morning and evening worship sessions at the youth chapel.

Youth Rallies

The youth love worshipping and having fellowship together. They enjoy each other's company. Thus, we create opportunities for them to come together during the year. Throughout this quinquennial, we had four rallies held at Clarksburg, Parkersburg, Charleston, and Rainelle. During the rallies, we met in the morning for worship, had lunch together, and then went out into the community to knock on doors, feed the homeless, and help families in need.

Mission Trips and Service Projects

Being the hands and feet of Jesus is the best way to stay active and serve Christ. During this quinquennial, we have planned three mission trips and multiple service projects. In 2019, we partnered with ShareHim on a trip to the Dominican Republic where many people gave their lives to Jesus as a direct result of the meetings that were led by our

young adults. In 2020, we traveled to Costa Rica to help build a church and preach at an evangelistic meeting. Due to COVID-19, we were unable to have the evangelistic meeting, but we were able to focus on the building of the church. Since we completed this project, many people have been baptized and have joined this congregation that for years could not grow because they did not have a place to meet.

In 2023, we traveled to Madugulapally, India where we provided the community with dental, medical, and ophthalmology services. We also painted the Adventist School and painted and repaired the church there. We were able to buy new mattresses, pillows, and bedding for all the boarding students, and we built a road to the school. During the reaping meetings that we held, 48 people were baptized.

We have also done service projects in our territory during the past five years. The week of camp meeting, we helped the Elkins Seventh-day Adventist congregation with painting and cleaning projects at their church and school. One sabbath afternoon, we had a youth Rally in Rainelle where we knocked on doors, and on the following Sunday, we aided them with their building project. Also, there was a day when a work bee was led by youth to help the Moorefield Spanish Church with their building project. Our youth are more than willing to help those in need. They would rather spend time doing things that show Jesus than just talk about Him without any action.

Moving Forward

Our emphasis will be "growing young" in our conference. This emphasis will focus on six main strategies:

- Keychain Leadership is the empowering of youth and young adults with real responsibilities. However, it is not just about handing down a position, but to mentor, collaborate, and develop relationships with these individuals.
- 2. Empathize with today's young people instead of criticizing what we don't understand of this generation, invite conversation to learn and begin or deepen relationships.
- 3. Taking Jesus' message seriously. This is not just about entertaining youth and young adults, but taking them into a deeper understanding of God in a creative way.
- 4. Fueling a warm community is being intentional about building relationships with the younger generation. One thing that has been discovered is that having a five-to-one adult-to-youth ratio is very effective when adults commit to encouraging, praying, and building honest connections. It is about rethinking small groups and making them more relevant and appealing to this group.
- 5. Be the best neighbor. Both youth and young adults would like to see a connection between the Bible and what their church does for the "neighbors" (others in need). They want to be the hands and feet of Jesus, thus the importance of mission projects.
- 6. Prioritizing young people is about all the aspects of the church, including the budget, strategy, and worship planning. We will emphasize having our youth and young adults integrated into those facets of ministry.

We will do this by working with all the departments that work with children, youth, and young adults. We invite all churches that have an interest in "growing young" to be willing to make children, youth, and young adults a priority.

Summer Camp

Summer Camp Ministry is a door to the hearts of many children and youth. It allows us to share Jesus with youth that we otherwise would not have access to any other way. According to research done by George Barna:

"The probability of someone embracing Jesus as his or her savior was 32 percent for those between the ages of 5 and 12; 4 percent for those in the 13-18 range; and 6 percent for people 19 or older. In other words, if people do not embrace Jesus Christ as their savior before they reach their teenage years, the chance of their doing so at all is slim."

Thus, the importance of this ministry is to help our children and youth accept Jesus as their savior and to strengthen their relationship with Him.

Emphasis

Valley Vista Summer Camp program aims to show Jesus to staff and campers alike so a desire to serve Him can be born in their hearts. During this quinquennial, our themes were: "Crazy Faith" (learning to trust God at all times), "Divine Navigation" (learning to listen to God and trust His plans), "Secret Service" (our calling to be witnesses), and "Power Up" (receiving the armor of God). During the year 2020, we had to adapt to the circumstances, and instead of running a regular summer camp, we had a family camp format during the camp meeting.

This quinquennial has shown an increase in campers attending our summer camp program. Since 2021, nineteen youths have given their lives to Jesus through baptism. Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, the year 2023 was our best year with 94 campers and 11 baptisms during the summer.

We have seen a big change in the lives of the youth who go through our program, especially when these kids stay connected to one of our local churches for the rest of the year. This past summer we saw five of our regular campers give their lives to Jesus during the English and Spanish camp meetings.

Moving Forward

We would like for our program to continue growing and be able to reach more youth each summer. One of the challenges that we will run into is the need for larger and updated cabins that will hold more campers for our current staff to be able to supervise the campers properly. We are also looking forward to developing activities that will take advantage of the newest camp attraction, Mountain View Lake.
